U.S. SECRETARY OF EDUCATION ARNE DUNCAN REINFORCES IMPORTANCE OF THE ARTS IN SCHOOLS

Duncan featured on SupportMusic Coalition Conference Call Discussing His Letter to School and Education Community Leaders that the Arts Are Part of A Core Curriculum and Encouraging Use of Stimulus Funds

The NAMM Foundation announced that it hosted a live, public teleconference today with U.S. Department of Education Secretary Arne Duncan to discuss his recent letter sent to school and education community leaders outlining the importance of the arts as a core academic subject in U.S. public schools.

More than 1.75 million national music and arts education advocates were encouraged via a national network of coalitions to participate in the call to hear Duncan express his concerns about access to arts education in U.S. public schools, and how these programs can be supported in the future.

The call was initiated after Duncan issued a letter last week to school and education community leaders stating, "At this time when you are making critical and far-reaching budget and program decisions for the upcoming school year, I write to bring to your attention the importance of the arts as a core academic subject and part of a complete education for all students. The Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) defines the arts as a core subject, and the arts play a significant role in children's development and learning process..."

"The arts can help students become tenacious, team-oriented problem solvers who are confident and able to think creatively," he stated. "These qualities can be especially important in improving learning among students from economically disadvantaged circumstances. However, recent National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) results found that only 57 percent of eighth graders attended schools where music instruction was

offered at least three or four times a week, and only 47 percent attended schools where visual arts were offered that often."

"Concerned citizens in cities, towns and communities should share this letter with state and local school leadership," said Mary Luehrsen, NAMM's director of public affairs and government relations and executive director of the NAMM Foundation, who moderated the call. "The Secretary has clearly stated that arts education is part of the core curriculum and is vital to a complete and quality education for all children. All of us need to work together to assure that all children have access to a complete education that includes high quality, standards-based learning in music and the arts."

The SupportMusic Coalition conference call also reiterated the points in Duncan's letter about how state and local actions can be reinforced to assure access to arts education.

Duncan reminded listeners that under the ESEA, states and local school districts have the flexibility to support the arts through Federal Title programs and U.S. Department of Education programs, including professional development of arts teachers as well as for strategic partnerships with cultural, arts and other nonprofit organizations. In addition, Duncan stated that local school districts can use funds under the State Fiscal Stabilization Fund through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act for the arts along with other district expenses.

Duncan also outlined the Department of Education's National Center for

Education Statistics' (NCES) next steps for supporting the arts as part of a well-rounded curriculum. These efforts include:

- Conducting a survey to assess the condition of arts education in grades K-12. This fall, elementary and secondary principals will be asked about their schools' offerings in music, dance, theater, and visual arts.
- Surveying elementary classroom teachers next spring as well as music and visual arts specialists at the elementary and secondary levels about their programs and resources.
- Reporting findings from this comprehensive profile in early 2011, the first report like this since the 1999-2000 school year. The data is expected to help practitioners and policymakers make more informed decisions about arts education.

During the call, Duncan highlighted the series of music events at the White House that demonstrates the administration's ongoing efforts to stress the importance of arts education, beginning with a Jazz Education workshop in June with 140 students from across the country. At the July White House event reinforcing the importance of arts education, he joined the President and First Lady in featuring country music artists Alison Krauss and Brad Paisley, who appears in a White House video <a href="http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=WCv">http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=WCv</a> Uy540I7o released today.

#### HISTORIC MUSIC LICENSING AGREEMENT FOR EDUCATORS REACHED

The Music Publishers Association of the United States (MPA) has finalized a historic agreement with the Music Educators National Conference (MENC), the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) and the Harry Fox Agency (HFA) to create an easy, onestop mechanical licensing system for educators who wish to record music publishers' works and titles.

If a band director wishes to record any high school concert band title, they can get a license from the HFA's Songfile® website. A specially-designed entry page for this collaboration will be introduced this fall. HFA will collect the money and pay publishers directly with no commission deducted or fees taken.

Publishers will receive one hundred (100%) percent of the total licensing money.

Publishers who are not already affiliated with HFA need to affiliate with HFA to take advantage of this opportunity. In this circumstance, affiliation can be limited to representation for Songfile® licensing only, and then provide HFA with their catalog of titles. These can be provided in a standard Excel document. Songfile® licensing royalties are paid to all publishers commission-free. The usual \$35 affiliation fee will be waived for MPA publishers.

We will begin to roll out this program this fall and will continue to promote the system and encourage all schools, churches and institutions to use this easy and legal licensing model.

# INTERNATIONAL MUSIC COUNCIL HOLDS 3<sup>rd</sup> WORLD FORUM ON MUSIC IN TUNIS

The International Music Council's 3<sup>rd</sup> World Forum on Music will take place in Tunis, October 17-22, 2009, under the title "Access to musical diversity". The Forum is organized in collaboration with the Ministry of Culture and Heritage Preservation of the Tunisian Republic. IMC presents its World Forum on Music (WFM) as a global knowledge-building platform on music and society in the 21st century, which explores a variety of topics from diverse perspectives: cultural, political and economical. The IMC World Forum on Music is considered one of IMC's main contributions to setting the stage for the free celebration of music in the world. The 2009 World Forum on Music will focus on five areas which IMC considers being of crucial importance to the world of music:

- Cultural diversity: where do we stand?
- Music as a vector for dialogue
- Creativity and innovation in music distribution
- New approaches to music education
- Changing audiences: challenges for art music around the world

By seeking synergies across different sectors, this high-level forum will provide exceptional opportunities for scholars, government officials, private sector executives, professionals from the civil society, artists and students to engage in serious debates on current key issues. The Forum will also include a session that is specifically dedicated to Arab music, presenting local traditions

as well as contemporary production. Workshops will be organised to make participants better equipped to act proactively as advocates for music in their own environments and within their special fields of interest.

# NMC MEMBER REPORTS

#### **ASCAP**

ASCAP has experienced a truly momentous year. As its membership swelled to over 350,000 songwriters, composers and music publishers in 2009. ASCAP elected a new President and Chairman - Oscar, Grammy and Golden Globe-winning Hall of Fame songwriter Paul Williams. The writer of such timeless standards as "We've Only Just Begun," "Rainy Days and Mondays," and "An Old Fashioned Love Song," among others, Williams had been an active Board member for 15 years. His election followed on the heels of former President Marilyn Bergman's decision to step down after 15 distinguished years.

Williams was elected just prior to the fourth annual ASCAP "I Create Music" EXPO in Los Angeles in April. This year's music creator conference was bigger and better than ever as evidenced by the record turnout. The music community came to strengthen its bonds, make connections, share knowledge and confront the challenges of the digital era. Attendees were able to learn from an extraordinary range of top

music creators from across the spectrum, including pop/rock songwriters Ann & Nancy Wilson (Heart) and Jeff Lynne to R&B and hip hop icons Chaka Khan and Wyclef Jean to composer luminaries such as Johnny Mandel and Paul Chihara.

ASCAP brought the voice of the music creator to the 2009 CISAC World Copyright Summit in Washington, D.C. in June. ASCAP President and Chairman Paul Williams, along with ASCAP Board members songwriter Hal David, composer Stephen Paulus, publisher Roger Faxon (EMI Music Publishing) and publisher David Renzer (Universal Music Publishing), joined representatives from rights societies around the world to participate in discussing the "New Frontiers for Creators in the Marketplace." Through strong debate and with brilliant music, ASCAP delivered the clear message that it will continue to protect the rights of music creators in the digital age. The summit was capped by a special jazz concert featuring Stefon Harris, Ann Hampton Callaway and Joe Lovano and the Smithsonian Jazz Masterworks Orchestra led by David Baker.

The 10<sup>th</sup> Annual ASCAP Concert
Music Awards took place on May 21 at
the Times Center in New York City.
ASCAP honored Jack Beeson, So
Percussion, the founder of the Young
People's Chorus of New York, Francisco
J. Nunez, G. Shirmer's Kristin Lancino
and the recipients of the 2009 ASCAP
Foundation Morton Gould Young
Composer Awards. At ASCAP's 24<sup>th</sup>
annual Film & Television Music
Awards, film composer Carter Burwell
(No Country for Old Men, Being John
Malkovich, Adaptation) was presented

with the ASCAP Henry Mancini Award. Also honored in the Top Box Office Films category were past ASCAP Henry Mancini Award winners Han Zimmer, James Newton Howard and John Debney.

Seven music greats were added to the **ASCAP Jazz Wall of Fame** at a special ceremony at Jazz at Lincoln Center this year. The inductees included living legends Jon Hendricks, Johnny Mandel, Annie Ross and Randy Weston, and posthumous honorees John Coltrane, Dave Lambert and Tito Puente. Participating in the event as either presenters and/or performers were ASCAP Board member Marilyn Bergman and Alan Bergman, John Clayton, Joe Lovano, Eddie Palmieri, Karrin Allyson, Jay Leonhart, jazz historian Dan Morgenstern and WBGO radio personality Gary Walker. The Jazz Wall event also celebrated the 7<sup>th</sup> annual ASCAP Foundation Young Jazz Composer Awards, recognizing composers under 30 years of age whose works are selected through a national competition.

ASCAP presented Adventurous
Programming Awards for choral music
at the annual conference of Chorus
America and Adventurous Programming
Awards in orchestral music at the
annual conference of the League of
American Orchestras.

Looking forward, ASCAP has selected April 22-24 as the dates for its **2010 ASCAP "I Create Music" EXPO**. Registration for next year's event opens on Monday, November 2, 2009.

#### BMI

Grammy award-winning BMI composer Herbie Hancock (who received an American Eagle Award from the National Music Council in May 2009) will assume the role of the Los Angeles Philharmonic's creative chair next year. The jazz giant intends to pursue a strategy of cultural and musical "crosspollination," integrating visual art including dance and media such as computer graphics and film clips, along with miscellaneous music genres. including jazz, into performances. Hancock's duties will include the hiring and mentorship of new musicians, as well as programming for LA's Walt Disney Concert Hall and the Hollywood Bowl.

Donovan will be named a BMI Icon at the annual BMI London Awards, slated for Tuesday, October 6, 2009, at London's Dorchester Hotel, Park Lane. The invitation-only gala will recognize the UK and European songwriters and publishers of the past year's mostplayed BMI songs on American radio and television. The Icon designation is given to BMI songwriters who have bestowed "a unique and indelible influence on generations of music makers." Donovan joins an elite list of past honorees that includes multi-genre nobility Bryan Ferry, Peter Gabriel, Ray Davies, Van Morrison, the Bee Gees, Isaac Haves, Dolly Parton, James Brown, Willie Nelson, Hall & Oates, Paul Simon, Crosby, Stills & Nash, Steve Winwood and more.

Nine young classical composers, ranging in age from 17 to 26, were named winners in the 57th Annual BMI

Student Composer Awards. Newly appointed Awards Chair Ellen Taaffe Zwilich, BMI President & CEO Del Bryant, and BMI Foundation President Ralph N. Jackson announced the decisions of the jury and presented the awards at a reception held in May at the Jumeirah Essex House Hotel in New York City.
