## The AGO Launches New Online Community for Members

The American Guild of Organists recently introduced THE LOFT, a new, members-only online community powered by Higher Logic's Thrive platform. THE LOFT offers the AGO's 10,000 members an exclusive destination for connection and collaboration, a searchable member database, and a new channel for publishing content from The American Organist and posting blogs from educators and researchers, performers, and industry experts.

THE LOFT launched with four communities: an Open Forum for general discussion, and special interest groups for Composers & Arrangers, Young Organists, and Chapter Leaders. Thrive allows members to conduct online conversations, as well as share and archive documents. Future communities may include Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Accessibility (IDEA), as well as forums for part-time and substitute organists, and topics such as the music of Bach and Baroque Composers, Organ Design & Building, and Pedagogy.

THE LOFT is also prepared to host chapter communities, allowing individual chapters the option to move away from traditional newsletters and email for communications and shared drives or filing cabinets for document retention. Chapter leaders can easily post meeting notices, promote concerts and recitals, and share meeting minutes with all current members, with rosters updated automatically from the Guild's database.

"Like many organizations, the AGO struggled during and after the pandemic years," explained J.W. Arnold, membership, marketing & communications specialist. "We moved to Zoom for virtual events and are now seeing attendance slowly bounce back at our inperson conventions. THE LOFT will be a gamechanger, however, enhancing the sense of community among our members and leveraging technology to make our chapter operations more efficient."

"As more members opt out of our printed monthly magazine, The American Organist, in favor of the digital edition, THE LOFT will allow us to repurpose content in more creative ways and deliver member value across several digital channels, while still keeping its members-only availability," Arnold added. "And, as we enhance our website to include cynics national directories of substitute and freelance musicians, recital listings and concert calendars, we are focused on not only retaining members, but attracting a broader range of keyboard and other artists."

## ASCAP and RMLC Settle Rate Court Proceeding

The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) has announced a new settlement agreement with the Radio Music License Committee (RMLC) that secures higher rates payable by almost 10,000 of America's commercial terrestrial radio stations to publicly perform more than 20 million musical works in the ASCAP repertory. The ASCAP repertory includes the vast array of music that keeps radio's listeners tuning in, from today's Top Ten hits to classic songs across all genres of music.

ASCAP CEO Elizabeth Matthews commented: "This deal locks in an important royalty stream for our members at higher rates. It will deliver enhanced benefits, payments and financial certainty to ASCAP songwriters, composers and publishers, which is important to ensuring their creative and economic health and security now and in the future."

The settlement agreement includes year-overyear increases in the percentage of revenue rate paid by radio stations to publicly perform music by ASCAP members and better reflects the ways in which AM/FM radio stations in the US currently broadcast and transmit music to their listeners, while recognizing the distinctions between the terrestrial radio industry and internet music services.

ASCAP represents more than one million songwriters, composers and music publisher members. Founded and governed by songwriter, composer and publisher members, ASCAP is the only performing rights organization in the U.S. that operates on a notfor-profit making basis and does not have outside investors or private equity ownership. ASCAP delivers 90 cents of every dollar collected back to its members as royalties, ensuring that ASCAP songwriters and publishers are the sole beneficiaries of revenues collected by ASCAP.

## ASCAP Board Members Stand Up for Music Creators' Rights

A joint statement from all 12 songwriters and composers on ASCAP's Board of Directors on the importance of protecting the rights of music creators in the age of Al.

A Message from the ASCAP Board of Directors Writer Members:

We join together as songwriters, composers, lyricists and rightsholders to promote and strengthen the right of music creators to control the use of our work and to share fairly in its exploitation. We stand united in seeking ways to protect our creativity in a new era in which our music is increasingly being ingested, analyzed, shared, extracted and used as the basis for derivative, machine-generated works.

We recognize that changes in the music business are inevitable, and we support and embrace those that allow us to reach new audiences and those that can be used to enhance our creativity. However, we vigorously oppose those changes and policies that transgress our rights, weaken our legal protections, divert or conceal our rightful earnings, or provide other opportunities for those who seek to unfairly benefit from the works we have created.

We urge policymakers and the general public to understand and respect the creative process, recognize the fundamental right of music creators to fully consent to and participate in the exploitation of their music, and support a strong copyright office and the laws which have served and supported music creators for more than 200 years. By upholding these principles, we can ensure a future of human creativity in music, protect the livelihood of creators, and continue to cultivate the vibrant and thriving musical culture that is known and loved throughout the world.

#### ASCAP, BMI, GMR and SESAC Collaborate to Provide a Single Source of Detailed Public Performance Copyright Information for Over 38 Million Songs Offering Even More Transparency for the Industry

The four major performing rights organizations in the United States today announced a landmark expansion of **Songview**, the industry's comprehensive US public performance copyright data resource launched by ASCAP and BMI in December 2020. For the first time, the expanded Songview platform will feature information for over 38 million musical works

licensed by the four major performing rights organizations in the United States, offering the industry the most authoritative view of public performance copyright ownership and administration shares from a single source. This effort builds on each of the PRO's long-standing efforts to provide comprehensive data for their respective repertoires.

Over the coming months, Songview will begin incorporating data from GMR and SESAC, starting with the addition of all 100%-owned works represented by GMR and SESAC. In addition, Songview will enhance the limited data that currently appears for GMR and SESAC works by including the publisher names for GMR and SESAC works that have split ownership percentages with ASCAP and/or BMI, one of the most popular information requests from Songview users. The ownership percentages for the GMR and SESAC split works are part of a future plan.

"As a Member of Congress, I have long called for greater transparency into music licensing to ensure businesses have the information they need to make informed licensing decisions. This is because music ownership data has for years been fragmented and opaque, compounded by continued growth in the performing rights industry," said Congressman Scott Fitzgerald (WI-05). "With today's announcement, we take a giant step towards transparency, and towards my goal of a complete and authoritative database. I congratulate ASCAP, BMI, SESAC, and GMR on their partnership, and I look forward to continuing to work with them to ensure the database meets the needs of Wisconsin businesses."

House IP Subcommittee Chairman Darrell Issa (CA-48) said, "Our copyright system is the backbone of our creative economy, with clarity and transparency essential to ensuring creators

have the compensation they deserve while licensees have the predictability they need. I congratulate ASCAP, BMI, SESAC, and GMR on the launch of a new and improved Songview to enhance clarity and transparency in music licensing."

ASCAP CEO Elizabeth Matthews commented, "We are thrilled to collaborate with BMI, GMR and SESAC as we innovate to provide more transparency to licensees into musical ownership data for the combined repertories of the most performed music in the world."

BMI President & CEO Mike O'Neill added, "It was always our intention to ensure Songview would be the single most comprehensive source of copyright information for the industry, which is why the addition of GMR and SESAC data is so important. Having the four major US PROs come together to enhance data transparency highlights how we as an industry can successfully collaborate and deliver solutions that benefit the entire music community."

Randy Grimmett, Co-Founder and CEO of Global Music Rights commented, "With the addition of the GMR and SESAC repertoire to Songview, the most comprehensive view of US songwriter and publishing information will represent over 38 million works. This is a major step in addressing the needs of licensees for a comprehensive view of PRO licensing obligations."

John Josephson, Chairman & CEO of SESAC said, "The addition of SESAC and GMR to Songview will provide a comprehensive view of ownership data and licensing representation for the largest music market in the world. This collaborative solution addresses requests from licensees and Congress that extends the visibility of repertory data already available from SESAC."

The Songview engine was built from the ground up by a cross functional team of copyright,

technical, distribution and product experts from ASCAP and BMI. The system ingests song ownership information, processes and reconciles that information based on agreed-upon rules, then sends the reconciled data back out to the ASCAP and BMI searchable databases. Information displayed for those works includes songwriters and their affiliations, publisher data, performers, alternate song titles and ISWC and IPI codes. Reconciled songs appear with a green checkmark to indicate that each of the PROs agree on the information.

The information is free to the public and currently accessible on the <u>ASCAP</u> and <u>BMI</u> websites.

## Strengthening Piano Education from Coast to Coast: 30 Chopin Scholarships Awarded for 2025–26

The Chopin Foundation of the United States is thrilled to announce the <u>thirty scholarship</u> <u>recipients for 2025–26</u>—our largest slate of awards since the program began in 1998. This significant milestone, following a record fifty-two applications from dedicated student pianists nationwide, is a testament to the program's momentum and the enduring appeal of Chopin's music. It's a moment of pride for all of us and a promising sign for the future of piano education.

Our <u>Scholarship Program for Young Pianists</u> invests directly in learning. Awards of \$1,000 (full) and \$500 (half) are paid directly to teachers, schools, and festivals so that support lands where it matters most—in lessons, coaching, summer study, juried programs, and sustained work at the keyboard. Spanning up to four years, the program encourages steady growth in Chopin's core repertoire, helping students chart a path toward the National Chopin Piano Competition and fostering a lifelong relationship with Chopin's music.

By the numbers, this cohort also tells a story of continuity and progress. Of the thirty awardees, nineteen are first-year recipients, joined by five second-year, three third-year, and three fourth-year scholars whose ongoing development we are honored to support. Our thirty recipients reflect a truly coast-to-coast national picture: California contributes twelve scholars, several states—Massachusetts, Texas, and Kansas—each contribute two, and the remainder stretch from Maryland and Pennsylvania to New York, Michigan, Utah, and Oklahoma.

Behind every award is a circle of guidance and care. We extend warm congratulations to the recipients and heartfelt thanks to the teachers, families, and schools who make this progress possible; to the distinguished members of the Scholarship Committee—Peter Miyamoto, Catherine P. Middlebush Chair of Piano, University of Missouri; Mack McCray, faculty of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music; and Tian Ying, Associate Professor of Keyboard Performance, Frost School of Music, University of Miami—for their thoughtful evaluation and careful adjudication of applications; and to every applicant who took the courageous step to apply. The future of Chopin's music in the United States is bright, and these students are already adding their voices to that light.

### **Make Music Day**



#### Make Music Day 2025

This year's Make Music Day on June 21, 2025 was the largest to date, with 5,471 free concerts, jam sessions, and group lessons across the US. This international celebration of music was first launched in 1982 in France, where it is known as the Fête de la Musique, and has spread to more than 2,000 cities in dozens of countries around the world. In the US, 147 communities took part in 2025, all coordinated by the nonprofit Make Music Alliance.

National Music Council members played a key role in Make Music Day initiatives this year.

2025 marked the tenth year of the NAMM **Foundation's** presenting sponsorship of Make Music Day. This year, 147 music products companies and retailers in the US joined in hosting, sponsoring, and organizing Make Music Day events. Notable participants included Sweetwater and Guitar Center, Alfred and Hal Leonard, Martin Guitar and PRS Guitar, Flight Ukulele and Kala Ukulele, Kawai Piano and Yamaha Piano, Harman and Sennheiser. Vic Firth and Pearl Drums, and D'Addario and Elixir Strings. NAMM members were featured in special national initiatives including "String Together" (guitar restringing events), "Let the Music Move You" (carpool karaoke), and "Mass Appeals" for ukulele groups, drum circles, and bucket drumming sessions open to all.

The Music Teachers National Association led a project called "Roomful of Pianos", which grew out of a NAMM Show initiative that brought spectacular multi-piano arrangements to the show's piano exhibition spaces.

The concept came to Make Music Day for the first time in 2023, with local piano showrooms hosting similar events around the country, inviting the local piano community to come in and sight-read multi-piano works together. In 2025, the MTNA took the lead and invited their local music teacher associations to take part. This year, there were 15 Roomfuls of Pianos on Make Music Day, including one in Las Vegas featuring 102 pianists playing on 50 instruments!

In the second year of Make Music Alliance's partnership with the National Federation of High School Associations and Alfred Music, school bands across the country were offered free, early access to a new Brian Balmages piece called "Critical Impact" for them to play for Make Music Day. (Schools also had the option to record a video of their performance in advance and send it to the Make Music Alliance.) The piece was flexibly written for Concert Band, Full Orchestra, or a mix of band and strings. Teachers and students were also asked to submit a short video about how music education has made a "critical impact" in their lives, with Alfred Music offering gift certificates to those who submitted.


The MPA Awards were established to honor those who have devoted their careers to different facets of the Music Publishing industry, through education and advocacy, championing composers, and empowering educators and students.

## Music Performance Trust Fund



The recording industry's Music Performance Trust Fund (MPTF) distributed \$193,000 in grants supporting 66 admission-free live concerts taking place throughout the United States on June 19, 2025 in recognition of Juneteenth National Independence Day. Juneteenth is a national holiday that commemorates the emancipation of enslaved people in Texas, specifically in Galveston, on June 19, 1865. Events were organized by American Federation of Musicians locals to ensure fair compensation for all performers. Juneteenth is the longest-running African American holiday and is celebrated to honor the freedom and perseverance of Black Americans. Among the many MPTF-sponsored events:

- "Broadway Celebrates Juneteenth" took place in the heart of New York, NY, featuring performers from 15 different Broadway shows.
- A concert in Houston, TX exclusively featured African American composers, with local Houstonian and GRAMMY and Emmy Award-winning baritone, Reginald Smith, Jr. and the Juneteenth Chamber Orchestra, Mary Cox, conductor.
- A Jimi Hendrix concert was free and open to the public in Los Angeles, CA.
- "Music Makes Me Free" highlighted songwriters and performers of the American blues movement as part of the Juneteenth celebration in Plymouth, WA.
- The Boston Public Quartet in Boston, MA presented a program celebrating the music of Black American composers including Florence Price, William Grant Still, and Julius Eastman.
- "King! Jackson!" in Cleveland, OH honored Martin Luther King, Jr. and Mahalia Jackson, who were close friends and collaborators during the Civil Rights movement.

Members of the Orchestre Métropolitain offer free concerts in neighborhood parks, offering communities the opportunity to experience symphonic music in a location that is free and accessible to all. This recent concert at the foot of downtown Montreal's famous Mont-Royal park attracted 50,000 spectators for an

unforgettable night of music at the heart of the city. The program featured works from Stravinsky, Mendelssohn, Beethoven, and more. Support for participating musicians of Local 406, Montreal was provided by the Music Performance Trust Fund.

Students from the Nat King Cole Generation Hope (NKCGH) Summer Jazz Camp recently showcased their skills in a performance alongside quest artists Ernie Adams, Bethany Pickens, and Ted Brews from Chicago local 10-208. The one-week camp provides high-quality jazz instruction to middle and high school students with the greatest need. The program is a collaboration between NKCGH, VanderCook College of Music, and VanderCook students, who act as mentors. Support from the Music Performance Trust Fund ensured that these and other local members worked and performed with students throughout the week. Nat King Cole Generation Hope, Inc. provides access to music education for children with the greatest need by cultivating opportunities and funding programs for instruction, mentoring and resources. Founded in 2008, the nonprofit strives to uphold and build on the Cole family legacy, who envision music education as an entitlement, not a privilege, for all children.



A scholarship program utilizing assets of the MPTF has granted financial support to 103 postsecondary students in the United States and Canada for the coming academic year. The MPTF's Music's Future scholarship is providing support this year to 30 individuals pursuing degrees in Music Performance, Music Therapy, Music Education, and Music Conducting. Recipients range from students entering their first year of college to those pursuing graduate degrees, all who intend to continue actively making and sharing music in their professional lives. The organization established its Music Family scholarship to encourage American Federation of Musicians (AFM) member families to pursue higher education and become leaders in their chosen fields. Recipients of this scholarship are majoring in a wide range of academic fields including music performance, psychology, film, nursing, history, and journalism, among others. Total disbursal of \$148,000 this year represents less than 3% of the MPTF's total annual grant distribution.

The oversight committee of the Music Performance Trust Fund is pleased to announce the appointment of music recording industry veteran Greg Linn as Trustee of the fund, effective September 1, 2025, following Trustee Daniel J. Beck's retirement and new title of Trustee Emeritus. Linn was selected for his financial acumen, creativity and integrity in the music business, traits that are key to the success of the MPTF's mission, which for more

than 75 years has been to provide admission-free, live performances by professional musicians throughout North America. He is an accomplished music industry executive and marketing strategist with over 30 years of experience, renowned for his expertise in breaking new talent and revitalizing catalog releases. Beginning his career at BMG Distribution and RCA Records, he joined Columbia Records in 1995, where he contributed to milestone releases such as Bruce Springsteen's The Rising (2002), Bob Dylan's Modern Times (2006), David Bowie's The Next Day (2013) and AC/DC's Black Ice (2008).

He played a pivotal role in launching the careers of artists like Hozier, John Mayer, Dave Matthews Band, Brandi Carlile, Leon Bridges, and Train while delivering innovative campaigns for global superstars. In 2015, as Senior Vice President of Marketing & Content at Legacy Recordings, he led high-profile projects including Leonard Cohen's posthumous album Thanks for the Dance and milestone reissues for Pink Floyd's The Dark Side of the Moon, AC/DC's Back in Black, and Highway to Hell. His leadership in the music industry has earned recognition in Billboard, HITS Daily Double, and Variety, reflecting his reputation as a visionary strategist with a legacy of impactful campaigns.

The MPTF plays a vital role in support of music's gig economy. The organization has distributed millions of dollars in financial resources and grants, engaging professional musicians that are members of the American Federation of Musicians (AFM) to perform live in admission-free events across North America. ## NAFME PUBLIC POLICY AND ADVOCACY UPDATES

#### **Arts Education Alliance Advocacy Campaigns**

This past summer, NAfME joined a coalition of nonpartisan organizations representing millions of communities, school districts, educators, families, and learners in a letter urging U.S. Department of Education (ED) Secretary Linda E. McMahon and Director of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Richard Vought to immediately disburse legally obligated education funds to states, including Titles II and Title IV-A and the 21st Century Community Learning Centers—all programs that can support a well-rounded education that includes music and arts—intended for the 2025–2026 school year. NAfME launched a grassroots advocacy campaign (now archived) on behalf of the **Arts Education Alliance** and other national organizations that did not have access to their own virtual advocacy tool. More than 1,400 individuals participated in the campaign sending 4,700+ email messages and making more than 230 phone calls to Capitol Hill. The OMB announced on July 21 that it would be releasing the 21st Century Community Learning Centers funds and a second announcement on July 28 that states would receive the remaining funds the following week. In response, the Arts Education Alliance issued a **statement** calling on arts educators to continue their advocacy efforts in support of the funding for fiscal year (FY) 2026.



Critical education federal funding is on the chopping block right now as members of Congress address federal appropriations for FY 2026. NAfME and other members of the Arts Education Alliance urge advocates in every state to ensure their elected officials in Washington, DC. 

the Federal Circuit decision that determined that
the International Emergency Economic Powers
Act (IEEPA) does not grant unlimited
presidential authority to impose tariffs.
The tariffs remain in place through October 14
during the appeal process, with a final Supreme
Court decision expected in early 2026. Register
